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They range from 2 to 18 years old and they all have different stories on how they lost their limbs. Some due to injury, some disease and disorders. Regardless of how, the core of who they are is just like any other kid their age. They play baseball, they run and smile and laugh. Thirteen kids from all over the United States are at Camp No Limits in Live Oak Florida through Sunday, learning how to push beyond their physical, social and emotional limits and to realize that nothing is impossible.

Camp Counselors say socializing with kids just like them is often times the first time they've realized that they aren't alone.

"I think it's cool to have other people like me, that have a missing foot, missing arm. So I think that's what I want to learn, that I'm not the only one and there are lots of different kinds," says 10-year-old Adam Rusmisell who has two prosthetic limbs.

Camp No Limits has made a difference in hundreds of kids lives nationwide, first in Maine and now for the first time, it's making its mark in Florida.

"It's very uplifting and self esteem booster and you don't have to worry about other kids looking at you, people staring at you. You can just be yourself, have fun and be a kid," says Regas Woods who has two prosthetic legs and is a volunteer at Camp No Limits.

So they may look a little different on the outside, but deep down, kids will be kids.
